

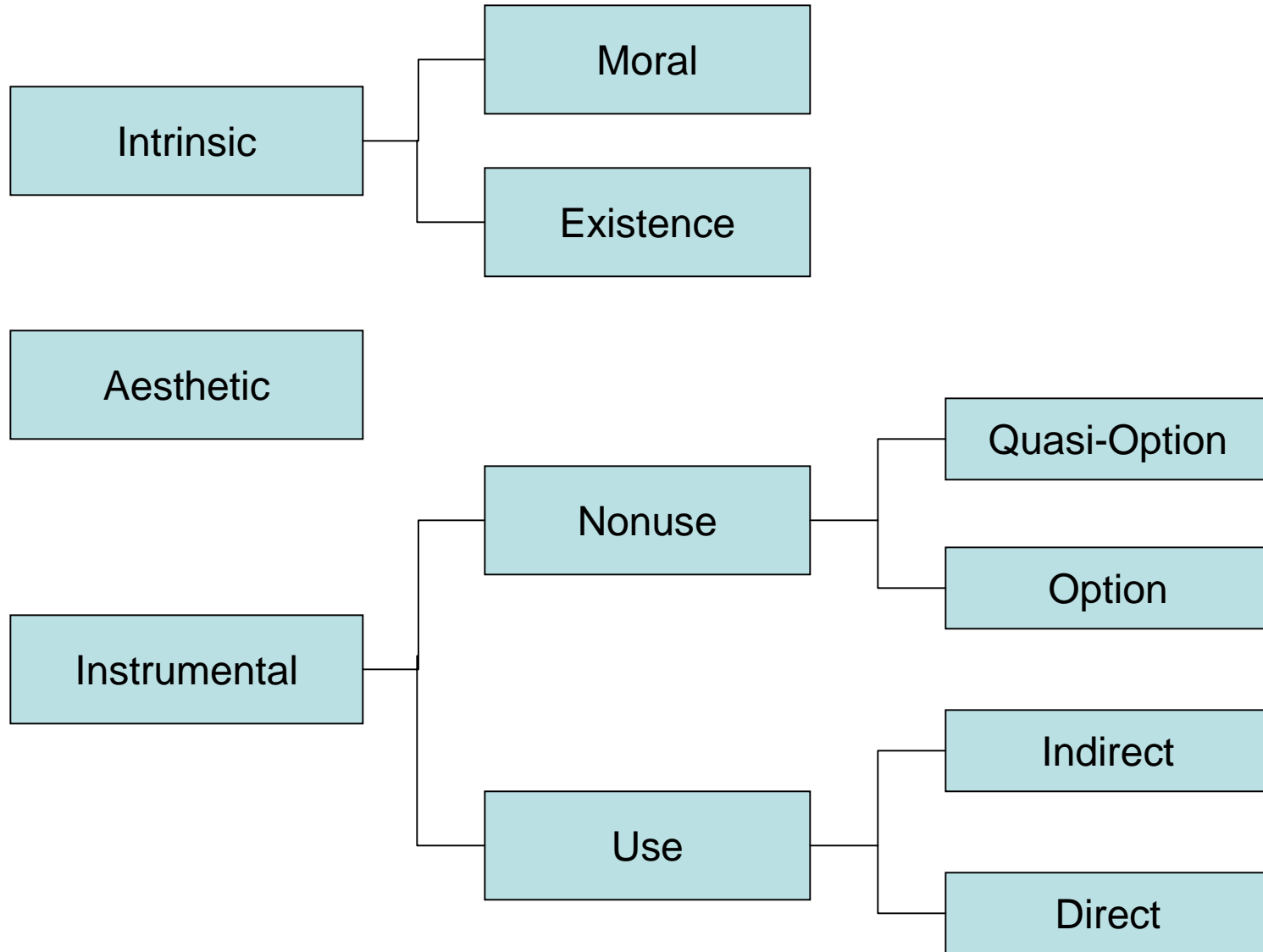

- 2) Evaluate such action in relation to a standard of responsible professional conduct and management obligation to stakeholder interests

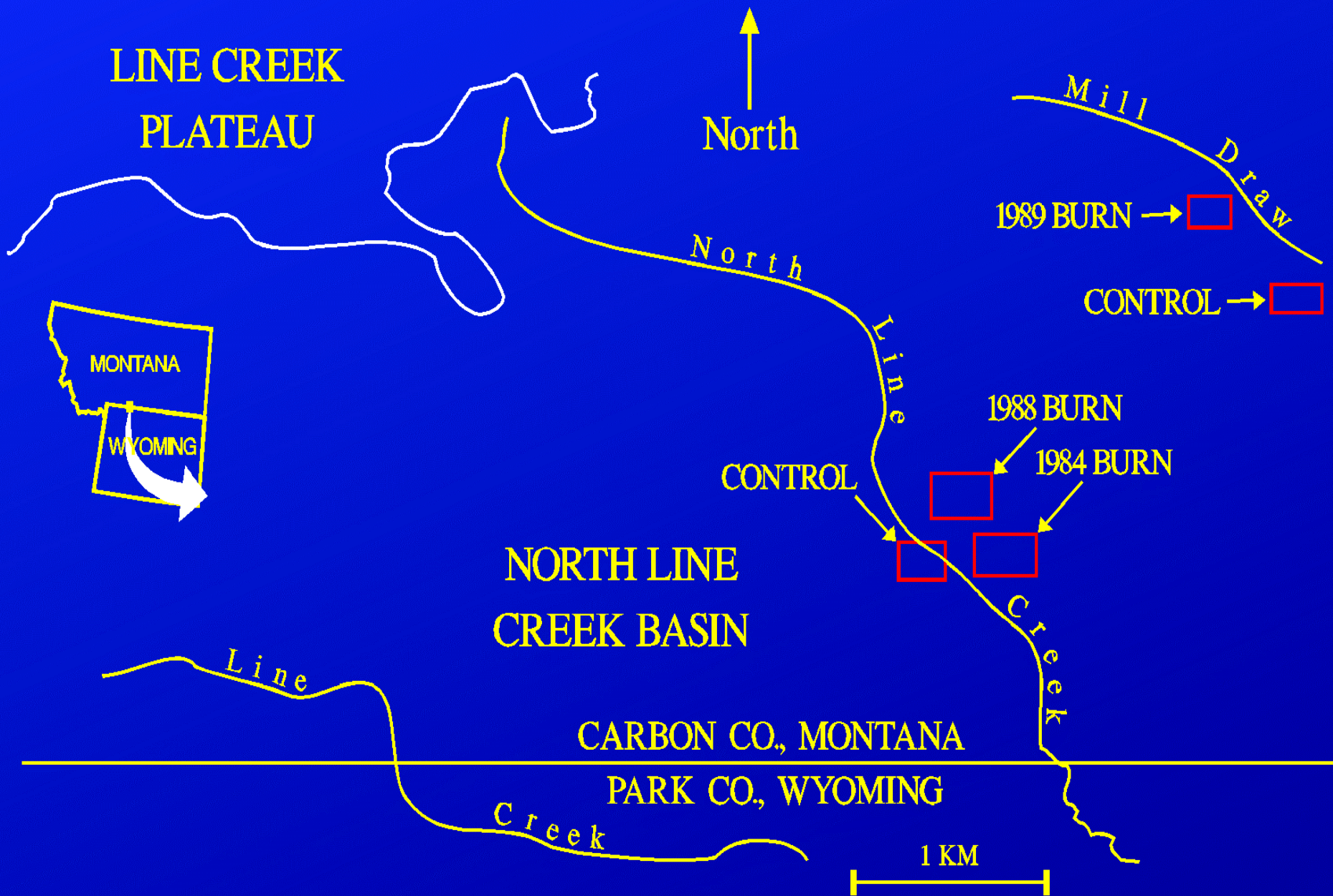
One Definition and Two Controversial Quotes

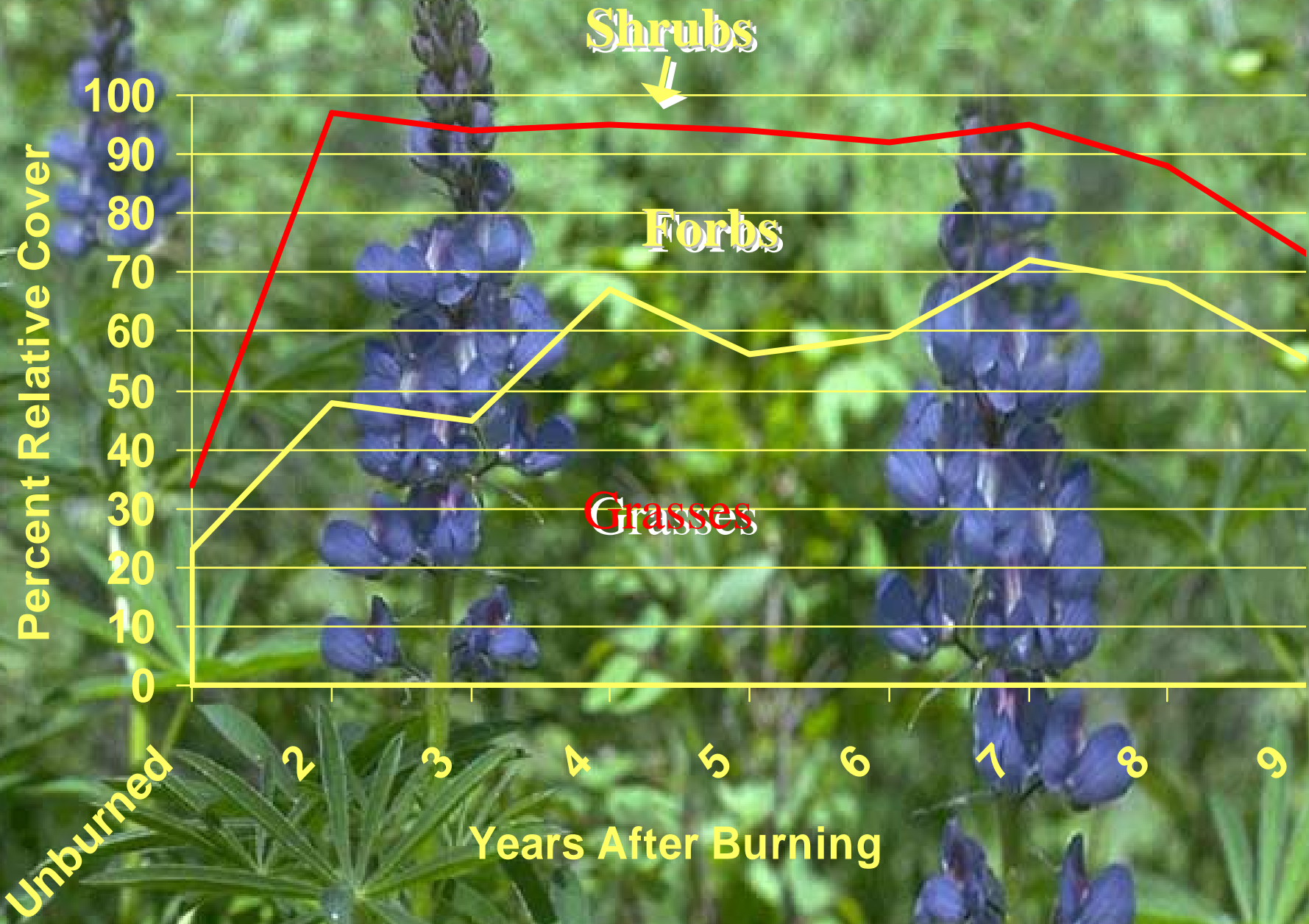
- Management (in conservation): *human action taken to remedy a deficiency in a system as determined by scientific assessment*

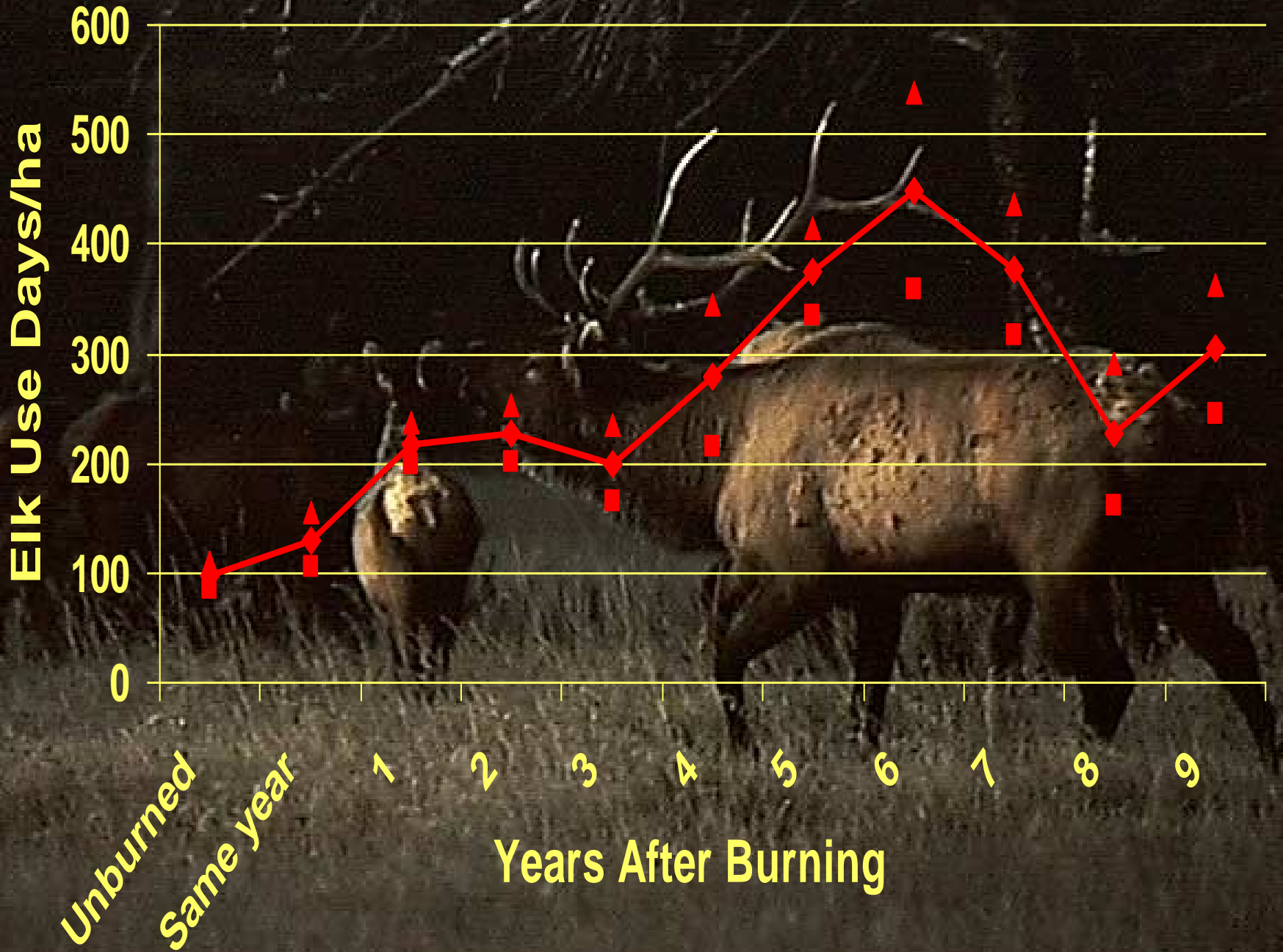
Categories of Environmental Values

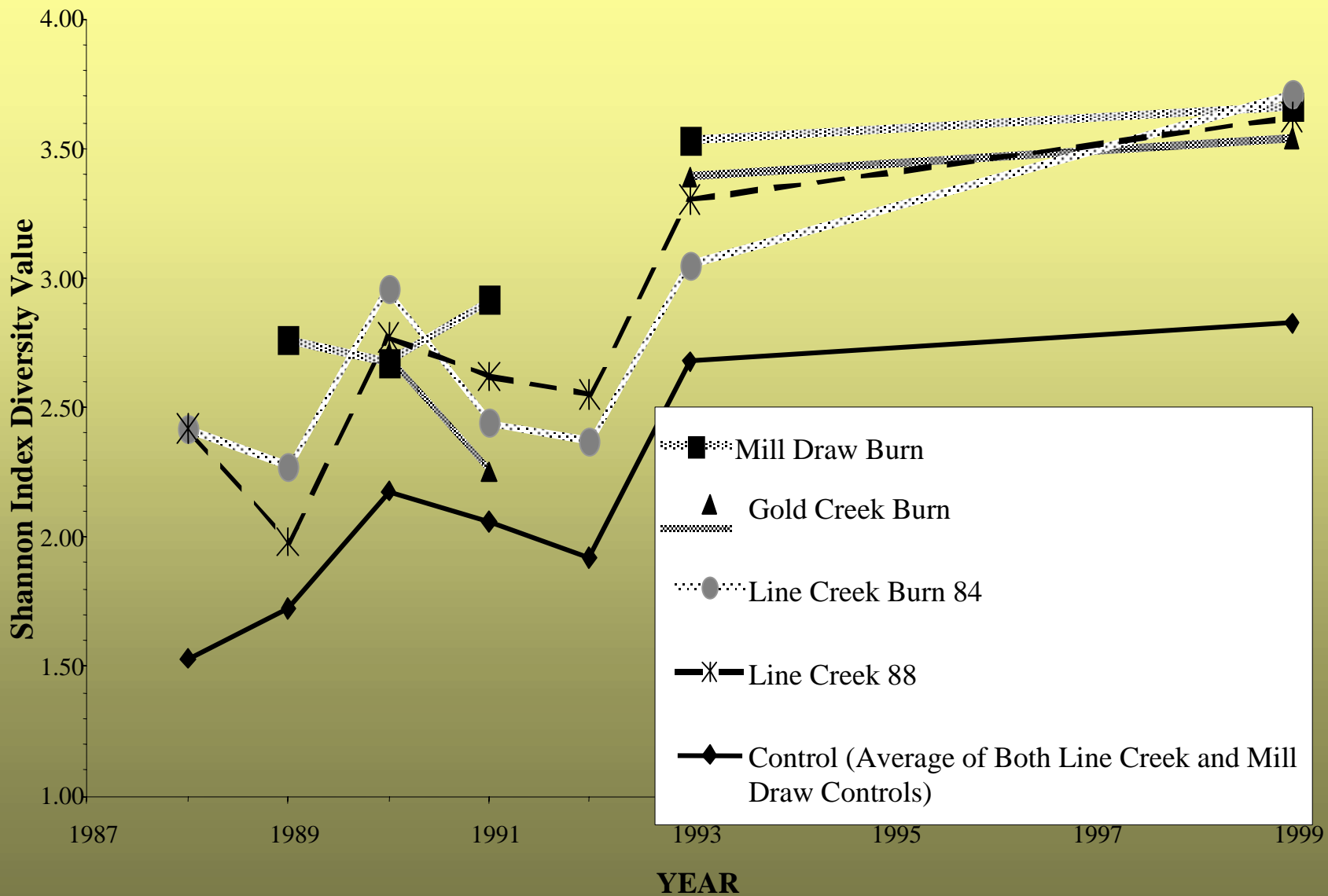


Value: The basis for an estimation of worth

- 5) What value(s) (see previous definition) does this management action endorse or enhance? In what way? Consider your answer in both categorical and specific terms. What values, if any, are neglected or diminished through this management action? What entities, if any, are harmed by it?
